Thank you for your dedication to this cause. Together, we are making a difference, and together, we will end human trafficking in Canada.



# What is Human Trafficking?

Human trafficking is the forced participation in the sex trade or labour market — manipulation is used to exploit individuals and take away choice. It is one of the most heinous violations of human rights.

It can happen anywhere at anytime.

Every day at-risk youth and adults are lured into human trafficking in cities and towns all across our country because they are unaware of the malicious tactics used by predators.

What starts as a seemingly innocent conversation online or in real life can quickly turn into something sinister that affects lives forever.

When we know who is most vulnerable and the signs to watch for, we can all take steps to prevent it from happening.

#### **UNDERSTANDING THE ISSUE**

Human trafficking is a lucrative crime and the perpetrators use sophisticated manipulation techniques to lure victims both online and in-person. Predators are talented at recognizing vulnerability and our best tool is to teach Canadians to know the signs.

Unfortunately, criminal enterprises and traffickers are actively recruiting every day in Canadian urban and rural areas, and across provincial borders. It's a growing Canadian problem that goes largely unnoticed because victims are first lured by false trust and then stripped of their ability to make decisions so that they are ultimately controlled by threats, coercion, and manipulation.

#### WHO ARE THE VICTIMS?

Being lured into human trafficking can happen to anyone, anywhere, and at any time. We know that youth, women and men fall victim to this crime. Human trafficking happens in cities, towns, and rural areas across Canada. It happens to people of every age, race, and income level.

Statistically, those most likely to be at-risk include:

Women and girls; migrants and new immigrants; LGBTQ2+ persons; persons living with disabilities; children in the child welfare system; at-risk youth; those who are socially or economically disadvantaged; and

Migrant workers may be particularly vulnerable to exploitation and abuse due to many factors, such as language barriers, working in isolated/remote areas, lack of access to services and support, and lack of access to accurate information about their rights.

#### **FORMS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING**

Human trafficking exists in two main forms in Canada:

#### **Sex Trade**

**Examples** • Forced paid sexual services

Massage parlours
 Stripping

#### Warning Signs

- Sudden interest in a man several years older
- · New clothing, jewelry, or gifts without having money
- Frequent sleepovers at a friend's house
- Sudden change in style of dress or make-up
- New circle of friends and isolation from their old group
- Change in attitude towards school, regular activities, and friends
- Grades are dropping
- Unexplained cuts or bruises
- Using two cell phones

#### **Labour Market**

**Examples • Nannies • Live-in caregivers** 

Agricultural or construction workers

## Warning Signs

- Have a job offer that seems too good to be true
- Have an employer who makes threats of deportation or reporting immigration status to police
- Have an employer that withholds personal identification
- Feel their life or those they love could be in danger if they don't work long hours and/or accept a lower wage
- Have to relocate with few details and no payment upfront
- Live and/or work in inhumane/terrible conditions

#### WHY DON'T VICTIMS ESCAPE?

Traffickers are skilled at luring and influencing, and they use various methods to gain and then maintain control over their victims. Grooming is a process whereby predators work to gain the trust of the victim while isolating them from family and friends. Control is kept through physical violence, sexual assault, and emotional abuse or manipulation. Victims may face severe consequences if they refuse to comply or attempt to escape. Traffickers clearly violate the basic human rights of their victims.

It is NEVER the victim's fault. Human trafficking survivors embody unparalleled strength and resilience, emerging from situations no one should ever endure. Anyone anywhere can be lured into this heinous crime, and no survivor is to blame for their circumstances.

This online hub provides education and tools to help Canadians across the country learn to recognize the signs of human trafficking to prevent this crime from occurring. We offer a wide variety of programs for individuals such as parents, teachers and youth, as well as professionals who work with survivors including webinars, in-person seminars, virtual training and more.

By learning about human trafficking, you will:

- Find out who's at risk and the warning signs of human trafficking.
- Know what actions to take if you suspect someone is at risk or being trafficked.
- Have conversations with your friends and family to raise awareness and stop this crime from happening.

All courses and workshops are provided for FREE. The Centre's programs are delivered in-person, online or through workshops. Help spread the word. Encourage your family, colleagues or community group to take a course too.

We've had an astounding 335 million views of the campaign ads on billboards and digital signs. Our media interviews on CBC, CTV, CityTV, and the National Post have further amplified our message, reaching a wider audience. We're proud to report that thousands of people have visited the trafficking signs.ca website, numerous shares of our social media posts and we've fielded calls from victims who are now getting help as a result of seeing our campaign.

## **MESSAGE FROM OUR FOUNDER, JOY SMITH**

Dear Friends and Supporters,

I am so excited to share some of the amazing programs we are implementing across Canada with you! They are making a difference!

Our office is very busy as we reach across our Nation to bring awareness to our communities about human trafficking and how to protect our youth from predators. This year, hundreds of students have experienced presentations from the Joy Smith Foundation about human trafficking so they can gather the knowledge of how traffickers operate. When students have disclosed that they were trafficked, we work hand in hand with teachers and parents to help those students recover from their horrific ordeal.

A survivor who was still living at home while she was being trafficked said: "I thought I was trapped. They drove past my house to let me know they were watching me. The presentation from the Joy Smith Foundation at my school gave me the courage to call and tell them what was happening. I am safe now."

The **See the Trafficking Signs** campaign, a first of its kind, was launched across Canada and received over 335 million media impressions across print, broadcast, on-line, and advertising platforms. A survivor called our office from Toronto after she saw the **See the Trafficking Signs** billboards and tearfully thanked us for launching this initiative. She said: "If I had seen these signs years ago and knew about human trafficking, I would never have been lured and trafficked. I would have known what to look for and I would never have been bought and sold."

There are other programs we have launched that have enhanced our Survivors program as well as others helping others. The **Luma & Bloom** podcast has lifted many viewers up as they listen to the inspiring messages the Podcast guests relay to them.

I want to thank all the teams across Canada who participated in our annual **Joy In Action** fundraiser! Every year it gets bigger and bigger! The value of this fundraiser is that it is reaching across Canada, and more and more people are becoming aware of human trafficking and how to protect their families from these predators. It takes a Nation working together to stop human trafficking.
